Lord's Prayer Poll

New research suggests The Lord's Prayer is still more easily instantly recognised by the British public than some of the most famous lines from Shakespeare, Dickens or Churchill.



People in the UK are more likely to identify correctly a short extract from the Lord's Prayer than one from the National Anthem and other sources chosen for their deep cultural resonance, a new poll has found.

The polling, carried out for the Church of England ahead of the annual Pentecost prayer initiative <u>Thy Kingdom Come</u>, also found the reference in the prayer to being forgiven and forgiving others was the element people found most meaningful to them.

Another interesting highlight was that almost six in 10 people have prayed the Lord's Prayer in their daily life which is very encouraging and shows that the prayer is still very much part of our national make up.



Each card contains an attractive image, a relevant Bible verse, a short explanation of the Christian faith which changed this land, and a simple prayer.

They needed to know that they were not alone, and how to find a way through day by day. That's why their deep trust in God's help on their pilgrim-journey through life can encourage and inspire us today.
